Let's Recap:

When we pray and say, "Amen," we are saying, "Let it be so." There is a sense that when we amen a prayer, we are firmly staking it into the ground. "Amen" is not meant to be said lightly, and God is not bound by our "Amen," but we are to align with His "Amen." There are times in scripture where "Amen" is used twice in a row to bring a new level of emphasis to what is being said.

Tune In:

In preparation for this week's discussion, read the following double amen passages: Psalm 41:13, Psalm 72:18-19, Psalm 89:52, John 3:3, John 5:24, John 8:4, John 8:51, John 13:20, John 14:12, and John 6:47.

Go Deep:

1. What are some promises God talks about in His Word that encourage you? How do you hold onto these promises in your life?
2. What do you think God is challenging you to say a "double amen" to in your life? What bold prayers are you praying and believing God for?
3. Pastor Rob talked about his dad as an influence in his prayer life? Who would be some of your influences in prayer? What did you take away from the prayer habits of others?

Live Out:

Nobody began their statements with "Amen" other than Jesus, and this is because Jesus is the "Amen" that God sent to overcome sin and death. In other words, we don't need to doubt the promises in God's Word because He has already said "Amen" to them in Christ. Indeed let's pray with so much more faith because we understand that God has already won the victory through Jesus.
